


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

HISTORY AND HERITAGE

a short history of Monaghan


County Monaghan takes its name from the Irish '*Muineacháin*', meaning '*little hills*'. Inhabited from an early era, many relics of the Bronze Age have been unearthed throughout the county over the years. It was later the centre and heartland of the *Kingdom of Oriel*, and an ancient monument at Donaghmoyne is reputed to have been the residence of the Kings of Oriel. The arrival of Christianity saw Saint Patrick visit several locations in the county, while his 'right-hand man' – Saint Macartan became patron of the Clogher Diocese of which County Monaghan forms approximately one half. Tiernach of Clones and Dympna of Tydavnet later became two of Ireland's best known saints.

The Vikings were invaders during the $10^{\text{th}} - 11^{\text{th}}$ centuries while the Normans arrived thereafter. Prior to the 17^{th} century Plantations, County Monaghan was ruled by the McMahons who controlled four fifths of its area, and the McKennas who controlled the remaining one fifth. When the Elizabethans decided in 1585 to divide Ulster into **'shire-land'**, the boundaries of the county were laid out, roughly the same as today's, but it was not until the first decade of the 17^{th} century that the county was officially formed and named.

County Monaghan was among the more severely affected counties during the Great Famine of the 1840's, being listed in the half-dozen worst hit in all Ireland. In 1921 County Monaghan became a **'Border County'** and suffered a great deal from the imposed division of the country.

Today there are many heritage sites around the county which bear testament to its rich and varied past. There are heritage trails in several of the towns and villages which feature key sites of interest and there are guided options available too which add to the experience. Sites of particular interest outside of the town trails include Errigal Truagh and Donagh old graveyards, the Temple in Dartrey and Drumirril Rock Art site.

The illustration above shows the battle between Hugh O'Neil (2^{nd} Earl of Tyrone) and James Seagrave at 'The Battle of Clontibret' which was fought in County Monaghan in May 1595. This was part of the Nine Years War between the Crown forces of England's Queen Elizabeth I and the Irish led by Hugh O'Neill. The battle ended in victory for Hugh O'Neill, and was the first severe setback suffered by the English during the war.

The newly refurbished Kavanagh Centre (Open end 2019) tells the story of Inniskeen's most famous son – the poet, Patrick Kavanagh using immersive and interactive techniques to inspire visitors. There are 6 key zones in the exhibition and these focus on different times/aspects of Kavanagh's life.

A multi-media experience provides the emotional core of the exhibition with its visuals and sound effects and this is also used as a performance space for concerts and dramas. Very few writers have rooted their work so physically in recognisable fields and buildings as Kavanagh did and many of these places still exist. Visitors are encouraged to follow the Kavanagh Trail which takes in a number of these sites.

Swallow Studios is workshop to one of Ireland's best established textile artists, designer and Hand-Weaver Liz Christy. Liz readily welcomes visitors to see herself and her team at work and visitors get to see the different processes in the ancient craft of hand-weaving.

The poetry of Patrick Kavanagh who lived only a few miles away was the inspiration for her Kavanagh Collection and the tradition of the lace-making in the County Monaghan towns of Carrickmacross and Clones inspired the Renaissance Collection. Liz enjoys explaining how the weaver and loom work together to weave her scarves and wraps. In this way visitors get to experience living culture and ancient heritage brought together, with an insight into the unique 'Monaghan Textile Story'.

The Cassandra Hand Folk and Famine Centre is located in the old Round Tower School situated in the historic town of Clones, Co. Monaghan, and was built in 1859 by Cassandra Hand with proceeds from Clones Lace. Clones Lace was a famine relief initiative introduced by Cassandra after she arrived in Clones in 1847 during the worst years of the Great Famine.

With the beautiful image of Clones Round Tower visible through the classroom windows to the front, the remains of Clones Abbey on one side and the remains of a Norman Motte and Bailey on the other, the Folk and Famine Centre is centrally located as a stopping point to explore the town. An exhibition about the Famine in Clones is on permanent display and is being continually added to.

Open daily during the summer months and by appointment at other times throughout the year, the centre caters to visitors from home and abroad, and offers guided walks of the town, exhibitions, room hire, talks, music nights, school visits and so much more.

Monaghan County Museum first opened to the public in 1974. County Monaghan has seen many social, cultural and political changes both at local and national level since then. These diverse changes are reflected in the museum's collections of artefacts and displays. Every item in the museum collection is connected to the county in some way: it may have been found here, made here or owned by someone who lived here.

The museum collection covers all aspects of the county's history incorporating archaeology, the early Christian period, the plantation era, transport, conflict, agriculture, lace and folklife. The diverse range of services that the museum offers include; tours of the museum and exhibitions; workshops; walking tours of Monaghan Town; research; educational events; local history and heritage; outreach events and exhibitions and object identification. There are also a number of interactive displays which aid in the accessibility of the museum both physically and intellectually. *Opening times are Monday to Friday 11am – 5pm and Saturday 12pm to 5pm. Constructed of tin, St. Peter's Tin Church Laragh is one of a kind in Co. Monaghan and unique on the island of Ireland for its quirky design and carefully considered features.

St. Peter's of historic Laragh Village is literally built on a rock, in a beautiful woodland setting amongst the ferns and ivy. It is anecdotally said that its Swiss-Gothic hybrid style was applied by the mill owner and his wife following their honeymoon in Switzerland – its site carefully chosen to mimic that found in the Swiss Alps. St. Peter's Tin Church Laragh was deconsecrated in the 1950s, was restored by the local community and proudly re-opened in 2014. It is a very popular venue for intimate music recitals, lunchtime dramas, wedding photography, trad sessions, vintage displays, touring choral group performances, harvest banquets etc. Aside from scheduled events the Tin Church attracts a steady flow of visitors to this very rural area in Co. Monaghan.

The Tin Church is open to the public and free to visit 7 days per week from 10am-6pm (including Bank Holidays)







Rossmore Forest Park is located 3.5km south west of Monaghan Town on the R189 to Newbliss. It was formerly part of the Barony of Rossmore created in 1796 and covers over 320 hectares with many forest walks, a wonderful Playpark for children, a Giant Sculpture trail (with more giants in the pipeline), and remnants of its past life as an estate.

The site of the castle can still be seen in the park, in addition to a walled garden, pet cemetery, fish hatchery and reservoir. A further attraction is an avenue of Yew trees which runs for approximately 500m from the walled garden. The 6 colour-coded walks range in length from 2 - 8kms, are mainly in the forested area and are well signposted.

Dartrey Forest was formerly the estate of the Dawson family and is currently managed by Coillte as a commercial forest.

The Forest is bordered by a Famine wall which stretches half way along the road from Cootehill to Rockcorry. There are several walks in the forest and it is also famous for a number of historical monuments, in particular a temple of architectural significance which was designed by James Wyatt in 1770 and is modelled on the Pantheon in Rome. There are three walks (Fairfield, Deer and Temple Loops) which are colour coded and vary in length from 2.1km to 7.2km.

Lough Muckno Leisure Park in Castleblayney was originally part of the estate of the Blayney family from whom the town of Castleblayney takes its name. The twelfth Lord Blayney, the last to hold the title, sold the estate in 1853 to Henry Thomas Hope, after whom Hope Castle is named.

The grounds of the estate now form the wonderfully scenic Lough Muckno Leisure Park and the Castleblayney Heritage Trail takes in some historical sites within the park. Facilities include walking trails, picnic areas, an Adventure Playground, Outdoor Activity Centre and Open Swimming area. Lough Muckno is also an Angling Centre of Excellence with unrivalled access for anglers. There are 4 competition level angling stretches on the lake.



The Monaghan Way is a long-distance walking route that explores just some of county Monaghan's rich heritage.

The perfect way to enjoy the Monaghan countryside, the walk mixes gentle sloping hill gradients with flat stretches of open countryside. There are no long or steep climbs and the route reaches a maximum altitude of 317m at the summit of Mullyash. The walk from Clontibret to Inniskeen is 33.5 miles / 54 km in length and should be tackled over one or two days. The Monaghan Way Walk is closed annually from 12 midnight on December 24th to 12 midnight December 25th.

Monaghan is a town rich in architectural heritage. From 1513 to 1589 it was the headquarters of the chiefs of the McMahon clan, whose power was eventually broken by the English in the late 16th/early 17th century. Monaghan was basically a Presbuterian town for the next two centuries, and a colonial centre of commerce and local government.

This self-guided trail will take you to many of Monaghan's finest historical buildings from the 18th & 19th centuries. Visits to the County Museum. Peter's Lake, the Old Railway Station, Rossmore Monument. The Market House and the Courthouse are all included on the walk.

Motte & Bailey Fort, St. Tiernach's Grave. The Cassandra Hand Centre and the Canal Stores. You will learn about the Gaelic chiefs - the McMahons, how the town suffered during the Famine and how the establishment of the Irish Free State impacted on Clones, the improvement of Clones in the 19th century, especially with the coming of the railways and the unsuccessful Ulster Canal and how there are proposed plans to revive it.

Carrickmacross was developed around a castle built by the Earl of Essex in 1630 (the convent of the St. Louis Nuns stands on the original site). One of the most striking buildings in the town today is St. Joseph's, a Roman Catholic Church dating from 1866. Inside, you'll find ten stained-glass windows designed by Ireland's master of the art, Harry Clarke. Along with St. Joseph's, other sites of note include the ruins of the historic Magheross Church, St. Finbar's (Church of Ireland), the Famine Graveyard, Courthouse & Toll House.





COARSE AND GAME ANGLING



COUNTY MONAGHAN IS AN ANGLER'S PARADISE WITH ITS MULTITUDE OF LAKES AND RIVERS WITH ANGLER ACCESS. THERE ARE A NUMBER OF WELL-ESTABLISHED ANGLING CENTRES IN THE COUNTY AND A HOST OF FISHING VENUES THAT WILL CATER TO THE NEEDS OF ALL ANGLERS.

THE MAIN CENTRES ARE BALLYBAY, CARRICKMACROSS, CASTLEBLAYNEY, CLONES AND MONAGHAN BUT THERE ARE A NUMBER OF SMALLER TOWNS AND VILLAGES THAT WOULD ACT AS SUITABLE BASES FOR YOUR ANGLING TRIP.

COARSE ANGLING

There are no licence or permit requirements for coarse fishing in Co. Monaghan and many angling centres contain the commonly found coarse fish species – bream, roach, rudd, hybrids, pike, perch and eels. Some waters contain tench and carp. The centres based in the Erne Catchment in Monaghan – Ballybay, Rockcorry, Newbliss, Bawn/Latton and Clones – are within a compact geographical area and are only a short journey from each other. Carrickmacross is the centre of a network of premier coarse angling waters which produce excellent catches annually and Castleblayney is situated on the shores of Lough Muckno which has recently been developed in terms of angling access and is now one of Europe's premier coarse angling fisheries. Monaghan Town is an ideal base for fishing the waters of north Monaghan and South Tyrone.

GAME ANGLING

Angling associations, riparian owners and in certain cases Inland Fisheries Ireland, control fishing on some game angling waters and some have made day permits available. A state licence is also required when fishing for salmon and sea trout and local regulations may apply. Game angling waters include: The Bunnoe and Knappagh rivers and Lough Mourne (Ballybay); Loughs Boughagh, na Garnaman and Creevy and The River Fane (Carrickmacross); The Clarebane, Mullaghduff and Frankfort rivers and Milltown Lough (Castleblayney); Emy Lough, Lough More, The Bragan Lakes and The Monaghan Blackwater in North Monaghan.

Fishing guide services and boat hire are available on request and there is plenty of good advice and helpful local knowledge freely available from Monaghan anglers. A number of angling festivals are held in the county each year.


